




The story is set from





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Gators Double-up Pierce

The Green River Women's basketball team kicked off their NWAACC Western Division home schedule with a dominating, 103-66 defeat of the Pierce Raiders. The Gators took control from the beginning, leading 53-32 at half-time, and never looked back.

Head coach Eric Priebe was pleased with his teams performance, but sees room for improvement.

"We need to be a little sharper and have better flow," said Priebe. "This is only our second game with everyone healthy." Priebe likes the teams versatility and "ability to have a lot of different line-ups. Either big, small, or quick."

Jaime Smith poured in a team high 22 points to go along with 9 rebounds. Eleven Gator women scored in the contest including Jill Swanson with 16 points, 8 rebounds, and 4 steals, while Stephanie Imhof added 12

points, 8 assists, and 4 steals. Their scrappy defense swiped 18 steals and forced 34 Pierce turnovers.

The Gators look to improve on their 4th place NWAACC Western Division finish a year ago. Green River defeated defending Western Division champion Lower Columbia in their first division game this season. Catch the Lady Gators in action on January 20th at home when they face South Puget Sound or January 27th when they battle Centralia.

The Gator Men's basketball team took their first step in turning around their disappointing season. They evened up their division record with a 74-69 win over Pierce breaking a five game losing skid. Josh Campbell lead the scoring with 18 points and Greg Swain added 14 points and five assists. Steve Lewis had nine boards and three blocks to go along with his eight points. The Gators are at home against South Puget Sound on Jan. 20th.



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Hawks and Dawgs Make the Right Call

The Seattle Seahawks and Washington Huskies solidified their head coaching positions with long term, high priced contracts. This brings to an end the urgent hunt for two qualified head men, but begins a new football enthusiasm to the Northwest that has been absent for years. As we welcome Mike Holmgren and Rick Neuheisel to Seattle, we also have to welcome the fair-weather fans hopping on their respective bandwagons.

The Seattle Seahawks didn't waste any time by snagging Mike Holmgren away from the Green Bay Packers where he had rescued "The Pack" from the cellar of the National Football League. For a mere 32 million dollars over eight years, Mike Holmgren now wears the blue and green of the Seattle Seahawks. Holmgren, the highest paid coach in the NFL, will have complete control of the Seahawks football decisions. This is a smart move by Paul's Hawks for three reasons.

The first being that Holmgren is a proven winner and has succeeded at the highest level. He guided the Packers to back-to-back Super Bowl appearances in the last two years, beating the New England Patriots in 1997 for the title. Holmgren can also bring in an experienced staff already familiar with his style. This is not true for the other candidates such as Jim Haslett or Gary Kubiak. This experience and success demands the immediate respect

from his players. This respect has already been voiced by current Seahawks. Dennis Erickson was a proven winner at the college level, but not in the professional ranks when he was named head man for the Hawks in 1995. Holmgren is proven.

The second reason that Holmgren is the right choice is because he was the man that the fans wanted. The Seahawks have failed to reach the playoffs for ten straight seasons dating back to the 1988 campaign when they were eliminated by the Super Bowl runner-up Cincinnati Bengals. Fans need to be won back, unfortunately, by wins. True fans stick with the team regardless of wins or losses. The problem is that there are not 60,000 true Seahawk fans willing to buy tickets for eight Sundays every fall. This results in empty seats at the Kingdome, blackouts for the home viewing audience, and money lost for Paul Allen. In the 32 hours following the announcement naming Mike Holmgren head coach/general manager of the Seahawks 1,552 season ticket packages were purchased.

The final reason indicating a smart decision is that Holmgren will single-handedly bring the Seattle Seahawks into the national spotlight. The Seahawks are scheduled to play the Green Bay Packers next season. This is a natural choice for the league to put this much anticipated game on Monday Night Football. It has been six years (November 30, 1992) since the Seahawks last appeared on Monday night, that

night they defeated the Denver Broncos.

Now, let's talk about Saturday afternoons. The University of Washington shocked everybody by hiring Rick Neuheisel to replace Jim Lambright. It had appeared that the final choice was between Idaho's Chris Tormey and Toledo's Gary Pinkel when former University of Texas coach John Mackovic pulled himself out of consideration. Neuheisel's name was not mentioned in the search for a new coach. Neuheisel's contract is worth a reported \$1 million to \$1.5 million per year for seven years. This would make him the highest paid coach in the Pac-10 Conference.

Neuheisel gives the Huskies an edge in the west coast recruiting war. He has built a reputation as a fabulous recruiter who in recent years has had much success recruiting athletes from this state. Jim Lambright was faulted for the Huskies slip of in-state recruiting. This was shown both in the win-loss columns and top in-state talent leaving to play elsewhere. Neuheisel's hiring also makes it possible for Washington to land nationally recruited tailback Paul Arnold from Kennedy High School. Arnold had canceled his recruiting trip to the University of Washington after Jim Lambright was fired. Arnold reportedly speaks highly of the 37 year-old Neuheisel and had listed Colorado as one of his final choices. You can also plan on some present Colorado recruits following Neuheisel to Seattle.

Truth will be seen on National Letter of Intent day, February 4th. The Huskies need to return to domination of recruiting in the Northwest that led to the success in the 80's and early 90's for Don James.

Rick Neuheisel is a great choice to take over the reins as head coach at the University of Washington. Rick Neuheisel has already made a mark by bringing back the gold helmets. I believe that he will return the Huskies to the national power that they once were.

I can already hear people claiming that they were Seahawk fans when the Seahawks weren't cool, and claiming to be Husky fans through the probation years. While there are many dedicated fans, most were not. Dig through your closets and find your Seahawk T-shirt from 1988 and your Washington national championship sweatshirts from 1991. Dust them off, pull them over your head and wear them with pride as the faithful fan you claim to be. Or better yet, run out and buy your new Seahawk and Husky gear as if you'd been a fan all along. When the Huskies sprint out of the tunnel, siren blaring, wearing gold helmets on September 18th, Dawg fans will get that funny feeling unlike any other. Oh, sorry bandwagon fans, you wouldn't know anything about that. Please form a single file line, the bandwagon is now boarding. However, it doesn't depart until this fall. All aboard!

NBA Brown-nosing Begins
