The course in blueprint reading will be offered evenings from 7 to 10 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays beginning February 16. For those persons whose work schedules do not permit participation in this program, an additional class in blueprint reading is being offered from 10 a.m. to 12 noon on Mondays, Wednesdays and Fridays, beginning February 15.

These classes are designed primarily for those persons whose work involves them in the aircraft industry. Registration for these classes will be held from 7 p.m. to 10 p.m. Monday thru Thursday.

Friday Classes

Because of increased demands in welding instruction, the new class has been formed to extend classes to Friday evenings. Registration will be on a first-come, first-serve basis and will begin on Thursday, January 26.

Following instructions in the Bulletin, the student should fill out his application and mail it immediately in the envelope provided to SELECTIVE SERVICE EXAMINING SECTION, Educational Testing Service, P. O. Box 988, Princeton, New Jersey 08540. To ensure processing, applications must be postmarked no later than midnight, February 10, 1967.

TO STUDENTS' ADVANTAGE
According to Educational Testing Service, which prepares and administers the College Qualification Test for the Selective

Service System, it will be greatly to the student's advantage to file his application at once. By registering early, he stands the best chance of being assigned to the test center he has chosen.

The test centers include: Western Washington State College, Washington State University, Gonzaga University, University of Puget Sound, Whitman College, Shoreline Community College, and Central Washington State College.

Seattle Firm Sets Art Scholarship

A four year tuition scholarship, to the Art Center College of Design in Los Angeles, California, sponsored by the photography firm of Dudley, Hardin, and Yang of Seattle, in cooperation with the Photographic Arts and Science Foundation of Des Plaines, Illinois, is available to any citizen of the United States or Canada. This person must have a minimum of two years of college, a sincere interest in further study in the field of photography, and the qualifications as outlined by the Photographic Arts and Sciences Foundation.

In explaining the decision to establish the scholarship by Dudley, Hardin, and Yang, Chao-Chen Yang, President of the firm said, "We realize that the future of professional photography depends upon the training of the young people of today. With the costs of education rising each year, it is not always possible for a young man or woman, who has potential in photography, to afford the specialized training that is necessary to make them into competent professional photographers. We decided to do what we could to help such deserving students with the establishment of this scholarship. It is our hope that other firms and individuals in our profession will be able to offer similar programs in the future."

Qualifications

To qualify for application, the man or woman must be under 26, a citizen of the United States or Canada, a high school graduate; with a minimum of two years of college and a grade point of 3.00. In addition, the candidate must have expressed an aptitude for photography and be prepared to submit a portfolio of at least twenty pieces of work, along with a typed statement of his or her desire to work in the photographic field as a profession.

Deadline for application for the first scholarship is April 15, 1967 to either Dudley, Hardin and Yang or the Photographic Arts and Sciences Foundation. Applications are obtainable by writing to either organization.

Vern Hoffer Stars

Basketball is a strenuous sport if one is in perfect physical condition, playing basketball with physical handicaps is even more of a feat.

Vern Hoffer, 6-2 forward from Raymond, Washington, performs this feat two or three times weekly. Vern plays on the Green River Gator basketball team. According to some this in itself is a miracle but what makes Hoffer stand apart from the rest is that Vern plays with two sprained ankles and Osgood's Slatters Disease. This is a disease of the knees which hampers the ability to run and jump.

As a result of this handicap Vern plays with a massive strand of tape wrapped around his left knee; if laid in a straight line this tape would equal the distance across a basketball court.

Vern is 19 years old and graduated from Raymond High School in 1965. While there he lettered in basketball and track all three years. As a sophomore he played on a Raymond team which placed fourth in the Class-A tournament, as a senior he played on a team that placed sixth in the tournament.

Hoffer is no stranger to Gator Coach Aubert as he played under Mr. Aubert's direction for three years at Raymond.

Last year Vern attended Central Washington College where he played basketball until outside pressures forced him to quit.

As a Gator, Vern has scored 254 points for a 15.9 average and pulled down 98 rebounds. His game was 30 points against Shoreline, in that tilt Hoffer almost rallied Green River to a major upset.

If by chance you should attend a Green River basketball game take a look at number 24, that's Hoffer with the taped knee. If all else fails Vern should receive the award of "Taped Athlete 1966-67."

G.R.C.C. Seeks Upset Victory

Tomorrow night the Green River Gators will venture within the wall of mighty Everett to challenge the league leading Trojans. The Gators will seek to upset highly-rated Everett and will be fresh from Wednesday night's win over Tacoma 79-48.

The Gator victory put Green River one-half game out of the cellar with a 2-10 record as compared with Tacoma's 2-11 record.

The Gators never trailed in the contest and led 9-0 before a free throw by Bill Bailey enabled The Titans to score with 17:45 left in the first period.

The Gators, led by Greg Brovold's 24 points, tallied a 36-24 half-time edge.

Unlike previous games where the Gators went into the second period cold the Green River cagers came storming out of the locker rooms to continue their first-half dominance.

Vern Hoffer picked up 11 points in 25 minutes as he fouled out early in the second period.

Coach Aubert began submitting very liberally as the game began to become a runaway. The subs held their ground and refused to allow the Titans to narrow the gap.

Jim Linford scored the last Gator points after the contest was over — he was fouled as the buzzer sounded and sand one of two free throws.

Pandemonium swept through the crowd as the jubilant Gator fans broke across the court and carried Coach Aubert off the court.

GRCC's Ron Clark was the third racer on the course and made an

excellent run, but the timekeeper failed to clock him. Ron was allowed a second run and he started well, but fell on the last part of the course.

The course and weather were other than ideal. The upper portion of the slope was closed and the course had to be set up on the lower section. As a result, the gates were closer than a giant slalom, but further apart than in a regular slalom. Besides the difficulty of the course itself, the racers had to contend with slushy snow, wind, rain and fog.

Wednesday evening in the Auburn gym the wrestling team from Everett J.C. narrowly defeated Green River's constantly improving team. Scoring for the Gators were Walt Pedeferra in the 123 pound class with a third round pin, Don Edwards, 177 pounds, first round pin, and Dave Bartlett, 167 pounds, outpointing his opponent 17 to 3.

Green River's next conference match will be tonight at the high school against Centralia.

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
