Keating, Scalapino Invited To Talk on Viet Nam War

Two of the nation's leading authorities on the Vietnam question will appear at Green River College early in May to discuss that controversial topic which concerns so many college students.

Edward M. Keating, publisher and editor-in-chief of Ramparts magazine, the provocative Catholic layman's journal which has gained world-wide headlines, will talk on May 4 at 2 p.m. in the college library. His topic is "Vietnam and Asia."

The one-hour address by the prominent critic of the current policy of the administration will be followed by a question and answer period.

May 8

On May 8 at 2 p.m. in the college library Dr. Robert A. Scalapino will appear. Dr. Scalapino, a political science professor at the University of California at Berkeley, is a member of the U.S. Department of State's Advisory Panels on China and on East Asian and Pacific Affairs.

Keating is a native of New York City but now lives in California. He is a Stanford graduate, receiving his A.B. in 1948 and LL.B. in 1950. He is the author of "The Scandal of Silence" which deals critically with the situation of the layman in the Catholic Church and the Catholic Church in American society.

HARVARD GRADUATE

Dr. Scalapino has been associated with the University of California since 1949. He is a graduate of Harvard and taught there briefly. He has done a great deal of post-graduate study under grants from the Guggenheim Foundation, Ford Foundation, the Carnegie Foundation, the Social Research Council, and the Rockefeller Foundation.

Scalapino's academic and personal experience combined have given rise to some 50 publications, including a study for the Senate Foreign Relations Committee on Japan, Okinawa, Korea, Communist China, and Taiwan. He is editor of Asian Survey, as well as a comprehensive volume on "The Communist Revolution in Asia." He is the author of "The Japanese Communist Movement, 1920-1966."

Editor Injured in Car Accident

De-Ette Pravitz, editor of the Green River Current, was injured Wednesday afternoon when her car went out of control on a turn going down 320th Street toward Auburn. Her small foreign sedan went over the edge of the hill and rolled about 50 feet.

Miss Pravitz was treated in the emergency room at Auburn Hospital and released. She is expected to return to school sometime next week.

The 19 year-old freshman was on her way to the river to check out the course of the raft race scheduled for May 6. Following her down hill was Dr. Melvin Lindbloom, president of the college, who saw her car go over the edge of the hill. He rushed down the hill and pulled her out of the car. Others who rushed to her aid called the ambulance and she was rushed to the hospital.

Her condition Thursday was listed as fair.

Binnie Selected for National Institute

Arthur A. Binnie, chairman of the Technology Division at Green River College, has been selected to be one of 30 participants next year in the Junior College Student Personnel Training Institute at Washington State University.

The announcement was made this week by Howard B. Larsen, director of the Institute.

Mr. Binnie will be granted an all-expenses stipend to enable him to attend the year-long advanced study program. The Institute is sponsored jointly by Washington State University and the U.S. Office of Education under the 1958 National Defense Education Act.

Mr. Binnie, his wife, and family will move to Pullman next fall. The

program will begin September 25 and last until June 8, 1968. He will return to Green River the following year.

The program is designed for community college personnel work. One of the chief concerns of the Institute will be to prepare people to work in the comprehensive atmosphere of the community college.

Educators with varied backgrounds - not just counselors - were desired in the program. Mr. Binnie's extensive experience in vocational education had a strong bearing on his acceptance.

Thirty teachers from more than 250 applicants from across the nation were chosen for the program.

'Worst Journalism Ever'

Dear Editor:

I read, in the last issue of this paper, one of the worst bits of journalism I have ever seen. Your article concerning the ridiculous and totally ineffective "boycott" of Student Council broke almost every rule concerning good journalistic policy I know.

First of all, your front page news article, which contained no by-line whatsoever, was far more than a simple reporting of the facts. Its author editorialized consistently.

In addition, even though both your editorials miraculously appeared unsigned, I happen to know one of them was written by your faculty advisor. Instead of supporting this flagrant example of a biased press, he should have realized what was being done.

While he may have had extensive training in his field, his job with this school is that of instructor, not editor or reporter. His support of this garbage seems, to me, hardly professional.

Another example of poor editing can also be found on the front page. One has only to look at the articles there to recognize the error.

Saturday, April 15, Green River hosted a statewide WACCSG convention. Coverage of this important event was delegated to the seventh page in order to devote space for the interesting but rather unimportant story concerning the beauty contestants.

Granted, some problems do exist in our student government and the Current has the responsibility to report the facts to the student body.

However, I think that is where the paper's responsibility ends. It is not your role to act as "reformer" of the situation, especially when the reporters and editors are as flagrantly biased as you seem to be.

I would also like to add a solution to the problems of our student government. Here is a quote taken from the April, 1967 edition of Reader's Digest.

"At the University of Michigan, some students rebelled against the rebellors by starting their

own group, SPASM - the Society for the Prevention of Asinine Student Movements."

It might be beneficial and, if further such moves occur, necessary to institute such an organization on this campus.

Dr. Grant has just finished a publication for the state on the metallic ore deposits in the Cascade Range which will be published this fall by the Washington Department of Mines and Geology. It concerns the occurrence and mode of occurrence of metallic ore deposits in the Cascade range.

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

Triple Threat Joins Green River Sports

This column has saluted many fine athletes and other sports people in the past and now it would like to pay tribute to another outstanding product of the Green River sports program, Roger Sloan.

Roger came to Green River via Bethany, Oklahoma, and the United States Marines

Triple Threat

While in high school Roger established himself as a sport threat in football, basketball, and track. Playing end every fall, he earned, as a senior, all-conference, all-district, and honorable mention all-state. These same awards were bestowed upon him during his junior and senior years as a flashy guard in basketball. The spring found Roger competing in the high jump, broadjump, and pole vault. All three years Roger placed in the state track meet. He placed second in his sophomore year, and second in his junior and senior years. In 1962 he placed second in the Junior Olympics.

In his spare time Roger was president of his junior class, vice-president of his senior class, and his last year his classmates selected him as the person who had contributed the most to Bethany High School in his three years there.

Upon graduating in 1962, Roger answered the inevitable call of Uncle Sam and enlisted in the Marines.

Service Ball

While stationed at San Diego, Roger, playing quarterback, led the Marines to the all-service football title. His basketball was directed by Bob Stevens who coached at the University of South Carolina for 14 years. Roger soon became known for his pressing defense and his running offense.

This same trademark soon became known to 'Gator fans and opponents. Roger was instrumental in Green River's big upsets over Skagit Valley and Everett.

Track Standout

In the spring, Roger returns to again haunt 'Gator opponents, this time as a high jumper. Roger leads the 'Gator cindermen in that department with a jump of 6'2". He promises to be a real threat in the upcoming state track meet.

Aside from participating in the sports program, working and supporting his wife and two children, Roger has found the time to make the Green River honor roll.

Roger plans to return next year and then hopes to transfer to either Seattle Pacific College or Western Washington State College; both have offered him scholarships.

New Post-Season Football Attracts Huskies

A new postseason all-star football game has been added to the list of summer football. This game, between the Army and the Air Force, will be played at Frankfurt, Germany, on June 25. The two teams will be comprised of the nation's flashiest rookies.

Air Force will be coached by Jim Owens of Washington, Duffy Daugherty of Michigan State, and Ara

Parseghian of Notre Dame. Army will be coached by Paul Bryant of Alabama, Darrell Royal of Texas, and Bob Devaney of Nebraska.

Owens will be joined by two familiar faces as the Air Force will have Dave Williams and Tom Greenlee holding down the end positions.

The game has made the American and National Football League coaches unhappy. Because of the possibility of injury, this game, added to the older coaches' game in Atlanta, July 8, and the College All-Star Game in Chicago, August 4, many coaches fear that the new game will be a danger to their new prospects.

Green River Hosts Four-School Meet On Trojan Track

Tomorrow marks a first in Green River sports history as Green River hosts its first community college track meet. The meet will start at 1:30 at Auburn's Troy Field. Entered teams are Grays Harbor, Highline and Columbia Basin.

The following weekend the Gators travel to Skagit to meet the Cardinals, Shoreline, and Olympic. May 20 will find the Gators at Shoreline in the Northern Division Championships.

The Gators are still seeking their first win this season. The most points they have mustered in the last three outings is 39 against Skagit and Olympic. Last Saturday the

Gators fell to defeat after amassing only four points.

The Gators' big point maker is Greg Brovold who is starting where he finished in basketball — on top in points. Brovold has taken a first in the javelin with a toss of 173'11", a first in the 120 high hurdles turning the course in 16.9 seconds, and has placed second in these same events at other meets. He has collected 20 of Green River's last 82 points.

New Coaches Join Highline, Edmonds

Several new basketball coaches will be introduced into Washington's community colleges. Among these new faces will be Paul Knowles and Norm Goldstein.

Paul Knowles is switching from Peninsula to Highline. He replaces Jack Hubbard as head basketball coach. Hubbard resigned at the end of this season to become the athletic director.

Goldstein, one of Seattle's most successful coaches, is leaving Ballard High School to take over cage duties at Edmonds Community College, a new entry to the league.

Goldstein piloted the Ballard Beavers to three Metro League championships. He served as assistant coach for seven years and head coach for the past nine seasons. He said the move to Edmonds was "the toughest I've ever had to make."

Ballard's basketball teams compiled an outstanding record of 132 wins, 27 losses in the Goldstein Era.

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
