The Green River yearbook, *Knonahi*, has arrived.

Management Students Busy Earning While Learning Profession

Mr. Richard Passage reported to the Current that with given information from 27 students, the following study results have been discovered:

Management students, this year since September, have worked over 26,800 hours and have earned over \$35,000.

Over half of the students on campus are earning at least one half of their living and schooling expenses.

One young man attending Green River has earned over \$17,000 in establishing his own business.

Another student has invested over \$35,000 in a business this year.



Jones to Head State Council

The Green River delegation to Pasco failed to bring home a governor but during a surprise election within the President's council, John Jones, Green River A.S.B. President was elected to the post of chairman of the Washington State Council of A.S.B. President. Jones was nominated for the office by Olympic Junior College in Bremerton.

As the new chairman, Jones will preside over the council meetings and keep a regular correspondence with A.S.B. Presidents of all the Junior and Community Colleges in the state.

Jerry Wilcox, WACCSG representative from Wenatchee Community College was elected to the executive office of State Governor. Kathy Sheppard from Everett Junior College was elected Secretary of the State organization.

Next year's convention will be held at Shoreline Community College in Seattle.

Dedication Set for Oct. 16-19

"Man and Nature - Challenge for the Future," will be the theme for the formal dedication of Green River Community College October 16 to 19.

Dr. Emlyn Jones, general chairman for the dedication program, said that the four-day program will consist of a symposium, open-house, dedication and installation of the college president, Dr. Melvin Lindbloom.

"The symposium will be held to discuss the means of developing the Northwest in conjunction with present and future growth," Dr. Jones said.

He outlined the symposium subjects as follows:

Scenic resources - Developing park and wilderness areas, ski areas and access to these by the public; water resources - discuss not only the question of clean water, but to have

exclusive use of Columbia River water for local use; man himself - discuss how we can develop citizens who will be alert to these and other problems and make the wisest possible decisions about them, and finally, maintaining the beauty of the Green Valley area regardless of industrial, commercial and population growth.

The four-day program will start with an open house

and dedication on October 16 from 1:30 to 4:30 p.m.; symposium on October 17-19, and luncheon and installation of the president on the 19th.

Working on the dedication program with Dr. Jones are Orval Hansen, program committee chairman; Art Binnie and Dennis White, dedication and open house; Janice Cramp, installation of the president; Dr. Ed Fohn, invitations, and Dr. Melvin Lindbloom, finance.

LIBERTARIAN HERETIC Machiavelli Was Right But He Went To Hell

Niccolo Machiavelli is one of the most despised political writers in the history of political science. His best known work, *The Prince*, was intended as a handbook for a prince who would unify the disunited Italy of the 16th century. In *The Prince*, Machiavelli gives some of the most "immoral" advice. He advises, for example, that the prince should appear to have desirable virtues. Whether the prince has these virtues in fact is irrelevant; what is relevant is that he appear to have them. The actions and speech of a successful prince - or politician - must seem to be "all charity, integrity, and humanity, all uprightness, and all piety."

After surveying American politics, one fact becomes obvious: Machiavelli is right.

In the 1964 presidential election, Barry Goldwater appeared to be an extremist, and appearance corresponded to fact. Lyndon Johnson, equally extreme, appeared to be virtue and moderation personified. "400,000 American combat troops in Southeast Asia by spring, 1966? Not under a Johnson Administration," the President may have

said. "My opponent, however..." President Johnson's opponent however may easily have said, "400,000 American combat troops in Southeast Asia by spring, 1966? If the present trend continues, this may be necessary."

To a Machiavellian realist, Goldwater's defeat was no surprise.

Machiavelli writes that the successful politician should "know how to color his nature well, and how to be a great hypocrite and dissembler. For men are so simple, and yield so much to immediate necessity, that the deceiver will never lack dupes."

President Johnson - and the American voters - played their parts well.

Those eager to defame Machiavelli often remark that "Mussolini read Machiavelli." In the case of Lyndon Johnson, no one can accuse the President of reading, much less of reading Machiavelli.

Machiavelli died in 1527 with as little recognition as he has today. In 1559, in fact, his *Prince* was put on the Church's Index. He probably went to hell.

EDA GRANT TO RIVER VALLEY

Congressman Brock Adams said today: "The long hoped for assistance by the federal government to our local governments in the Green River Valley has become a reality. The Economic Development Administration has approved the projects of Kent and King County for access roads and sewer facilities which will allow our industrial expansion in the Green River Valley to go forward."

These funds have been obtained as a result of efforts by Mayor Thornton and Councilman Dave Mooney of Kent and the King County Commissioners led by Chairman Scott Wallace. These efforts were summarized in a meeting held by Senator Magnuson with Congressman Adams, Councilman Dave Mooney and Eugene Foley, Assistant Secretary of Commerce in charge of the Economic Development Administration. This meeting speeded these projects on to their successful conclusion.

In addition, Congressman Adams said: "This is an excellent example of the federal government assisting local governments to solve some of their problems. However, it should be emphasized that highways are basically a state responsibility while the development of local roads and sewer facilities are county and city responsibilities. The State of Washington must move forward in providing these necessary state facilities to support private business expansion. This includes providing adequate financing for city and county governments and the construction of highways in congested areas."

The projects that have been approved today grant \$4,913,000

Small Business Center Slated For Green River

Today, businessmen everywhere are confronted with the ever-growing need to find new ways of coping with the ceaseless problems of business. They must find new ways to widen narrow-

ing profit margins, to cut operating costs, to meet competition, to somehow overcome the shortage of trained people and to develop new business directions. Yet, nearly all of them are find-

ing it difficult to keep pace with the rapid changes and new developments that are taking place in management methods. And paradoxically some of these new methods could provide the kinds of tools they need to help solve their problems.

This is especially true of the small businessman. He, unlike the large corporation president, has little or no staff to call upon for guidance and counsel. Instead, he must rely upon his own knowledge, skill and experience to provide the answers. To continue in business, and to grow, the small businessman must broaden and sharpen his skills. And he must find ways of doing the same thing for those whom he employs. But finding the time and the ways of doing this is another of his many problems.

Green River Community College can, however, provide him with the means and the facilities that he and those whom he employs need to accomplish the broadening and sharpening process. Therefore, it is proposed that the College establish a "Management Center for Small Business."

The proposed Center would enable Green River Community College to serve its business community more effectively because its goals and objectives would be directed toward the needs and problems of the small businessman.

One of the Center's functions would be to conduct, on a regular basis, a series of seminars, workshops and training sessions.

A second selective service test has been set for June 24. Students must complete a registration form and mail before June 1 to be eligible. It is recommended that all eligible male students take the test.


