The ten students who have filed for freshman class offices will speak in the commons today at noon to end a week of campaigning which began Monday.

Vicki Sander and Mike Willis are the vice presidential candidates. Vicki also hails from Renton where she graduated from Renton High School in 1967. Mike is a 1967 graduate of Glacier High School.

Vie for the office of secretary-treasurer are Ben Bergsma, Jr., Mary Lenz, and Teri Williams. Also hailing from Renton is Ben, who graduated with the class of 1967. Mary graduated from Glacier High School in 1967, and Teri graduated from Meadowdale High School in 1966.

Rounding out the contests are Judi Baker, Gretchen Goetz, and Chris Harren. Two of these candidates will be selected as student council representatives. Chris and Judi are both from the 1967 graduating class of Auburn High School. Gretchen is a 1967 graduate of Mt. Rainier High School.

Any candidate may give an informal speech or talk at anytime or place he can gather interested students up until campaigning deadline at 5:00 p.m. today. From 8:00 a.m. Monday until 3:00 p.m. the same day, all pre-registered students will be allowed to vote for the candidate of their choice.

## Accreditation Committee Observes GR Activities

A committee of ten representatives from various colleges throughout the Pacific Northwest will be here October 30 and 31 to evaluate Green River College, says Dean of Students Earl Norman.

Accreditation will make Green River a member of the Northwest Association of Secondary and Higher Schools.

Dr. John Tucker, from the College of Eastern Utah, will be chairman for the committee.

Members will talk to both teachers and students, observe classes in session, and generally evaluate GRCC's facilities.

The committee will evaluate several departments including: humanities and fine arts, social sciences, math, business, voc. tech., administration, student personnel, and others.

After evaluations are completed, the committee may accredit GRCC for a period of one to five years.

## Twelve Hopefuls Prepare For Cheerleading Trial

A two week cheerleading workshop, under the direction of Kathy Pekie, yell queen, and Jim Moran, yell king, has been meeting three times a week since the first day of school preparing the hopeful candidates for the cheerleading finals.

## Business Revenue Triples

Business revenue at Green River has tripled over the past year, according to Mr. Steve Mattson, accountant in charge of student services and activities.

Last year, the cost of operations for student services and activities totaled to approximately \$51,000. It is expected this year that a cost of approximately \$105,000.00, three times that of last year, will be used. The last figure mentioned is based largely on the increase of the student body which has also increased approximately three times.

A combined figure, based on operations of the college, not including student services and activities, is \$2,010,510.28.

Another figure, including building fund expenditures, will total to \$478,205. This amount is expected to be used in completing buildings, landscaping and buying equipment.

The person in charge of operations is Mr. Paul Webb. He, along with Mrs. Dorothy Martin, handles the division of business management, operations, and the general funds of the college.

## Selective Service Deferment Deadline Slated October 24

Registrar Richard Barclay has announced that the deadline for selective service deferments is October 24. Transfer students eligible for the draft must have all of their previous college transcripts on file in the registrars office by October 17.

A selective service deferment can be given only to those eligible males who are full-time, matriculated students working toward a degree program at Green River.

To receive this II - S deferment, the eligible male must:

**Make Requests**

1. Request deferment from his local board by filling out form SS104 and submitting it to the board.
2. Request Green River College to mail a report of his status to his local board 30 calendar days after school starts by filling out form SS109 and submitting it to the registrar at the Main Office. The registrar will then certify the attendance and status of all those submitting the SS109.

**Class Status**

Green River College will then determine his class year as follows:

Next fall the student who has requested deferment as II - S must be in the next class year as shown above or expect to hear from his draft board.

"Filling out these selective service deferment forms is the students' own responsibility," stated Mr. Barclay. "Green River College is performing a service to eligible males by making these forms available in the Main Office, but each individual male must be responsible for filling out the forms and making sure he submits it before the deadline."

**Other Requirements**

All eligible males must also meet the scholastic requirements of Green River, that of having a 1.5 accumulative grade point average. A student falling below this requirement during a quarter will be given a chance the next quarter to raise the accumulative average to 1.5. If he does not receive a 1.5 GPA, he will be given six weeks to bring the average to 1.5, and then be dropped if he does not bring the average up to requirements. After being dropped from college, the student has the right of appeal.

Each eligible male attending college may extend his draft eligibility through a II - S deferment and may not be entitled to any other type of deferment after this.

## Loland, Wine To Speak at Open Forum

The second open forum at Green River College will be held on Tuesday, October 10, from 12:00 noon to 2:00 p.m. in the Performing Arts Center.

Mr. Vernon Loland, chairman of the Humanities Department, will speak on The Duty of Civil Disobedience. Col. William Wine (ret.), instructor of business at Green River, will oppose Mr. Loland's viewpoint.

After a brief rebuttal period, the forum will be opened to anyone who would like to comment on the topic: "Civil Disobedience: Crime or Duty?"

# Enthusiasm Noted In Coming Elections

Already the student government is making plans for the student body this year. One of the first of the great endeavors planned is the freshman class elections which take place Monday. It is indeed encouraging to note the enthusiasm in the students in their attitude toward these elections.

For the first time in the history of Green River not one office is being sought by a candidate who is unopposed. Ten incoming freshmen have met the challenge of getting their petitions signed, making posters, and swaying voters to their way of thinking. I only hope that the enthusiasm marked in this campaigning continues throughout the fall quarter and throughout the rest of the school year.

## Voter Preparation Important

While only ten students are running for an office, every full-time freshman is a voter and should be thinking of what preparation he should be making. The voter should be impartial until he has heard all candidates and then decide who is offering the most.

Because Green River is small, sometimes one person may be singled out as the person most likely to be elected to an office. As a voter, one should remember his responsibility to his class and school and not fall into this rut of thinking.

## Keep Open Mind

To be an effective voter, one must keep an open mind toward the candidates, their personality and ideas. Perhaps the choice will coincide with the favored candidate, but do not let personality be the sole basis of the way the ballot is checked.

Each student attending Green River should take time out to hear these candidates. Whether you are a freshman or not, the experience of being involved in the activities of your college is worthwhile in itself.

## Listen Carefully

I urge the freshmen to listen carefully, analyze each candidate, and think about the fact that your welfare and that of your class is at stake in these elections. Keep in mind also that out of every election Green River has held, because of varied reasons, at least one of the elected students was removed from office.

So, when you are listening to the campaign speeches Monday, think to yourself, "what does this candidate have to offer the freshman class, the college, the student government? Will this candidate be a dedicated officer and fulfill not only the obligations of the office, but also the responsibilities imposed upon him in the classroom?"

Voters: Think about your responsibility; think ahead, and vote sensibly, for the welfare of the college.

# Students Urged To Attend GRCC Council Meetings

Student government at Green River got underway with Roger Sloan presiding over the first regular Executive Council meeting September 26 as ASB President. Gary Gadwa, ASB vice president, conducted the first regular Student Council meeting September 28.

The ruling body of student government consists of two councils, Executive Council made up of the two class presidents in addition to the five ASB officers, and the Student Council consisting of the class vice presidents and representatives plus the representatives from each of the various clubs and organizations on campus.

## Finance

The job of Executive Council, chaired by the ASB president, is to receive and act upon all legislation dealing with finance and student activities. Legislation is then sent to Student Council for final ratification. Student Council is chaired by the ASB vice president. So far, this bicameral structure of student government has proved to be an effective system of check and balance. However, some flaws are yet to be eliminated in regard to origination of legislation and registration and campaigns during elections.

## Participation

Roger Sloan is anxious to get his government into full swing this year. He is looking for greater participation and regular attendance from all officially elected club representatives. However, Student Council, at its first meeting, set up a two week period to give the campus organizations time to select a representative. Until that time, each club is allowed to send a temporary representative to Student Council at noon on Thursdays.

It is the responsibility of each club to choose an effective representative as soon as possible.

## List of Clubs

A list of clubs represented in Student Council would include Art Club, the Knonahi, the Current, Political Action, Pep Staff, Deseret, Ski Club, Veteran's Association, Spanish Club, Radio Club, and Chung. Also included are Letterman's Club, Future Nurses, and Circle K, and the Chemistry Club. Many of these clubs will be meeting soon to elect officers.

# Withdrawal Date Deadline Nears

October 13 is the last day to withdraw from any class and receive a "W" and any refund. If a student drops a course between the third and sixth week, he will receive a "WP" or "WF" depending on his grade status at the time of withdrawal.

No class may be dropped after the sixth week of the quarter.

A change of schedule form must be completed and submitted at the time of withdrawal and a failure to do this will result in an automatic "F" grade posted on the student's transcript.

# Enrollment Surpasses 3,000

Enrollment for the fall quarter at Green River has surpassed the 3,000 mark, exceeding any previous quarter in the history of the college, and applications are still being accepted.

Presently approximately 1,680 students attend day, and 1,720 students attend evening classes, but with continuing registrations the daytime figure is expected to reach 1,700 and the evening figure will be close to 1,800.

Unofficial tabulation of this year's enrollment has exceeded last year's by 20 per cent.

Included in these figures are the Renton and Enumclaw branches of Green River.

One faculty member summed it all up as he was gazing at the hordes of students eating in the fall sunlight. "What are we going to do when it starts raining?"

# GRCCRB Moving Smoothly

An academic transferable program in all academic courses is being offered by the Renton Branch of Green River College in both day and night classes.

Mr. Harold Taylor, director of continuing education, stated that because the Community College Law of 1962 had been amended to include Renton in Community College District No. 10, which includes Green River, and because Renton is the largest city in the district, Green River College felt that there was an obligation to provide not only the day worker, housewife, and Renton community in general, but also the full-time student with a college program in that area.

Although the total figure of students registered at the GRCCRB is relatively small, Mr. Taylor indicated that classes are moving according to schedule, and that, because of the progress being made, there is a possibility that a campus may be built in Renton in the future.

# Toddlers Start College Early

The Family Life Education Program began a new adult education series of parent observation classes for parents of children 18 months to 2½ years of age this fall. Parent and child attend Green River together one morning a week from 9:30 to 11:30 a.m., with one evening parent discussion class monthly.

A Family Life instructor and two assistant teachers supervise these classes.

The children enjoy a specially designed nursery school experience. There will be creative activity such as easel painting, music, sliding, balance board, rocking horse, doll corner, push and pull toys, riding cars, and a social juice time.

In this observation laboratory setting parents have an opportunity to learn about child growth and

development during this important period in a toddler's life. A nominal fee is charged quarterly for the class to cover operating expenses and college registration. Enrollment is limited to 15 parents with their children.

Students may now apply for on and off campus jobs in the office of the coordinator of financial aid in the Main Building. An up-to-date list on the employment bulletin board in the main office keeps a record of available jobs on and off campus.

Mrs. Winnie Vincent, Coordinator of Financial Aid, also works in collaboration with the Washington State Employment Security Office.

The vocational student will have first priority for work done to his car, but other students or members of the faculty may have their cars worked on during the year if the particular field of repairs the vocational department is studying coincides with the kind of repairs needed by volunteered cars, according to Mr. Bob Gadwa, head of the vocational department.

A busy year is in store for those enrolled in the practical nursing program at Green River this year. Anatomy, physiology, mental health, communications, growth and development, and nursing care are only a few of the many subjects on the way to a nursing degree for these future nurses.

The nursing students attend college for four quarters and then take a state board examination. "No one from Green River has failed this exam yet," states Mrs. Lorenz, head of the nursing department.

Green River also offers a two year technician program, occupational therapy, with liberal arts and occupational therapy classes. Students can work toward an associate of applied arts degree through this program and can also transfer to a four year college to finish their program.

Mrs. Lorenz noted that there would be a two year registered nursing program in 1969. Those students wishing to become registered nurses may start at Green River and transfer to a four year college to finish up.

Money - Money - Money! It's the beginning of school again, and that means fees need to be paid and books have to be bought.

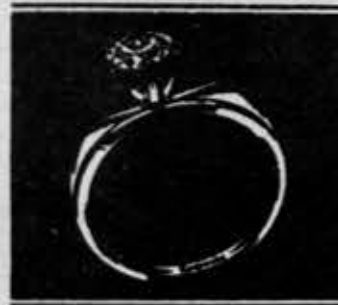
Scholarships are a valuable aid to students, and this year there are approximately 85 students enrolled at Green River College who are on scholarships.

The amount of each scholarship varies depending on the source and the individual needs of the student.

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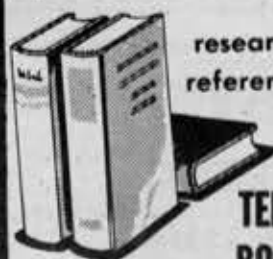
